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#### D'Var HaRav (The Rabbi's Message)

#### Feeding the hungry

I can almost smell the latkes frying in the fry pan as we approach Chanukkah. Those hunger pangs from Yom Kippur seem like they occurred ages ago, but I hope many of the messages of the High Holiday liturgy have remained with us. I find one of those messages to be particularly powerful. One explanation for fasting on Yom Kippur is to remind ourselves that while it is a conscious decision on our part to refrain from eating, some people do not get that choice and go hungry from necessity.

For Yom Kippur, as part of the morning Torah service, the Rabbis of the Talmudic era over a thousand years ago selected a passage from Isaiah Chapter 57 to serve as the Haftarah, the reading which expounds on a theme of the day, in this case on the meaning of atonement. When we look in our High Holiday prayer books on page 285 (and if you're able to look at that book at home, you probably need to return your book to the shul!!), we read (Isaiah 57:4-7), "Your fasting today is not such as to make your voice heard on high...the fast I desire [says G\_d] is to share your bread with the hungry and take the wretched poor into your home." Sadly, hunger is not just a serious problem worldwide - it is a significant problem out here on eastern Long Island as well.

I was truly impressed by the generosity of the Jewish Center of the Moriches in rising to the challenge of our food drive. This generosity was demonstrated by the overflowing boxes of non-perishable food which we collected over the holidays. This food drive was somewhat of a last-minute enterprise, but collectively we accumulated 277 pounds of food for Long Island Cares, the food bank serving our area. Traditional Jewish texts (Tosefta Gittin3:13) are explicit about our obligation to help out those who are hungry, whether or not they are Jewish – "...provide support for the poor of the gentiles along with the poor of Israel..."

The Kislev/December holidays in the United States allow us to express our Jewish identities while immersed as a minority in a dominant gentile culture. Our obligations to our non-Jewish neighbors stem from our understanding of the dignity of all humans, best expressed in the Talmud (B. Sanh 37a) where we are told that "God stamped all people with the seal of Adam the first person...therefore each and every person is obligated to say: The world was created for me." Let's continue to help fight hunger not just by gobbling latkes but also by embracing the message that the world was created for our neighbors as well as for ourselves.

# Member Spotlight Janet and Stuart Bossert

Janet and Stuart Bossert are two of the longest-standing, continually active members of the Jewish Center of the Moriches. The Bosserts moved to a then-brand-new house in Mastic with their two young children in 1977. They had some cousins who were JCM members, and that JCM connection made it compelling to join our congregation rather than one of the others in the area.

Stuart was soon asked to be part of the synagogue's Ritual Committee. "Most of the original members from the late '40s and early '50s were still in the congregation, so I got to work with original members. I got to see people that really, really cared about the congregation because they were the founders. I was very lucky to have worked with them and known them." He later joined the JCM board, in roles as trustee, vice president, and president.


Janet has been part of the Sanctuary Committee for many years; she's now the Chair of that committee and also currently serves as co-president of Familyhood. Their daughter Sandra and son Ken had their b'nai mitzvahs at JCM, and years later their granddaughters—now ages 21 and 19—had baby naming ceremonies at JCM as well.

Stuart had two careers. He was a salesman and owned a business in Mastic. After he sold the business, he took the New York State pharmacy technician exam, and spent the next 18 years working for the state at Stonybrook.

Janet began her career as a first grade teacher, then segued to being a Head Start teacher and a day care director. After she retired, she worked part time at Mastic Moriches public library. She continued working at the library, in the children's department, until very recently.

About half a dozen years ago, the Bosserts moved from their Mastic home to an age 55+ community in Moriches. "We met more Jewish people in 'the Waterways' than we ever did in Mastic," says Janet.

If you participate in any JCM activities--from Familyhood outings, to book club, to Shabbat or holiday services--you are likely to meet one of the Bosserts. "I don't think we've missed 20 Friday night services since joining in 1977," said Stuart.



# We Remember Michael Schondorf

In early October, Michael Schondorf passed away at age 90 after a brief illness.

Mike was born along the Czech-Hungary border, and after surviving the Holocaust and a living in a DP (Displaced Persons) camp, he moved to Israel, where he began learning the trade of electrician. In the mid 1950s, he came to the United States, where he married. Mike started his life over, and became a successful electrical contractor, running his own business for over 50 years. He and his wife raised their two children in Seaford (Nassau County).

Michael moved to Manorville in 2019, and became a member of the Jewish Center of the Moriches in time for High Holidays. We had the pleasure of hearing him leyn Torah during the holidays. In December 2019, Mike flew to Puerto Rico for the winter...and got stuck there due to the pandemic. Although he was physically far from JCM, Mike joined JCM via Zoom for holiday and occasional Shabbat services.

Mike spoke eight languages, including Hebrew and Spanish. He was a loving father and grandfather, a caring employer, a generous friend, and an upbeat and appreciative member of the JCM community. Mike was buried Oct 6th at Pinelawn Cemetery in Farmingdale. Rabbi Jack and Beverly attended the funeral, and offered condolences on behalf of the JCM community. May Mike's memory be for a blessing.

#### BLAST FROM THE PAST



When a group of us from the JCM attended Rabbi Jack's Kever Avot service in Mount Pleasant Cemetery on the morning of September 12th, we met a couple who had dropped by on their way from Nassau County out to the Hamptons. Spencer and Rhonda had come to the cemetery that day to pay respects at an old family plot where Rhonda's mother had been buried. We chatted with them both, and Rhonda told us about a family mystery involving the grave of Esther Gutterson.

Nobody in Rhonda's family knew who Esther had been and, in fact, Rhonda said that this had especially troubled her father for many years. No one in our JCM group knew anything about Esther, either, but several ideas were offered for Esther having found her way into the Tannenbaum family plot, one of these being that perhaps Esther had been buried in a charity grave due to not having had any living relatives to otherwise see her properly buried. This didn't seem likely that someone might have decided to bury an unknown person in the Tannenbaum family plot, and Rhonda was still deeply curious to know more about Esther. As for Rhonda's other relations, she was able to tell us that her "step-grandmother" had been Belle Bell (widowed in 1959 when her husband Saul passed away, and who later became a close friend of Rhonda's grandfather, Morris Tannenbaum). Rhonda's memories of Belle had been fond ones, recalling Belle's kindness and generosity in having given Rhonda a little blue wallet that she treasured as a child.

With these clues in mind, I later did some research and eventually came across Esther's obituary, which had been published in the December 5, 1974 issue of The Long Island Advance:

ESTHER GUTTERSON, 65, of Kew Gardens, died suddenly on Nov. 28. Mrs. Gutterson was born in New York City on Feb. 28, 1909. She is survived by two brothers, Al Spector of Patchogue, and Moe Spector of Florida, two sisters Mrs. Belle Belle Lurie of Center Moriches and Mrs. Jean Cardon of Florida.

Funeral services were held Dec. 1, at Sinnicksons Moriches Funeral Home, Center Moriches, with Rabbi Golshevsky officiating. Interment took place in Mt. Pleasant Cemetery, East Moriches.

Mystery solved! Esther had been a sister of Belle Bell, whose married name at the time of Esther's death was Lurie. Belle had married Louis Lurie (a self-employed physician) in October of 1963, following the death of Morris Tannenbaum several months earlier that year. Credit for further mystery solving goes to Mort and Gwen Stark, who told me that this "also answers our question of Al Spector carrying the Torah for the Jewish Center dedication ceremony in 1965." (If you get a chance, have a look at the old black and white photo that has been enlarged and can be seen in the JCM's Board Room.)

Many people already knew that it was Saul and Belle Bell who had purchased that Torah for the JCM, but Gwen Stark told me that it was Esther's obituary with its revelation that Belle's maiden name was Spector, which finally explained who Al Spector of Mastic Beach (Belle's brother) was in the photo that depicts him having the honor of carrying the Torah in that dedication ceremony.

#### \*Cemetery Committee

The JCM owns cemetery plots in Mt Pleasant Cemetery. These plots are for sale and occasionally someone contacts us to sell back their plot. Selling back plots involves the owner mailing the deed back, and coordinating with JCM's treasurer to send a check to the plot seller. Buying or selling back plots are fairly rare occurrences; usually this comes up once a year.

#### \*Newsletter Team

Create the "Shofar Newsletter", email it to the printer, pick it up from the printer, mail it. Newsletter format mostly stays the same with each issue. JCM is currently producing four newsletters per year, with one person acting as "editor" (collecting and/or writing newsletter content), another person doing graphic design, and a third person picking up the printed newsletter from the photocopy shop and mailing the newsletters.

#### \*Membership Liaison

Talk to prospective members when they contact the Jewish Center with questions: explain our programs, services, Hebrew School, and member pricing. This person is the "welcoming contact" that interacts with prospective members.

#### \*Ritual Committee

Works with the Spiritual Leader to integrate traditional Jewish practices, guidelines, and prayers into Shabbat and festival services, life cycle events, and other JCM activities. Endeavors to make JCM's religious atmosphere welcoming, inclusive, and accessible.

#### **Sunshine Committee**

Contacts sick/hospitalized members and sends condolences on behalf of the JCM community.

#### \*Phone "Keep in Touch" Committee

JCM is looking for a few additional people to join Judy Hean and Rabbi Jack in making "keep in touch" phone calls to community members. Each committee member will be given a list of people to contact on an occasional basis.
